Slip & Falls:

Who's Responsible For Sidewalk and Storefront Accidents?

What causes slip and fall accidents?

- **Be Cautious at Intersections:** Make eye contact with drivers before proceeding.
- **Watch for Parked Cars:** Keep an eye out for car doors opening unexpectedly.
- **Stick to Bike Lanes:** When available, bike lanes provide a safer space to ride.
