

Who Can Be Held Liable in an Uber or Lyft Crash?

Who is Liable in a Rideshare Accident?

Liability in an Uber or Lyft crash depends on who caused the accident and the rideshare driver's status at the time of the crash:

- **Rideshare Driver is At Fault:** Uber and Lyft provide insurance coverage, but the amount depends on whether the driver was waiting for a ride, en route to pick up a passenger, or actively transporting someone.
- **Another Driver is At Fault:** If another motorist caused the crash, their insurance should cover your damages.
- **Multiple Parties Share Liability:** Sometimes, both the rideshare driver and another motorist share fault, leading to complex insurance claims.

Common Rideshare Accident Scenarios

Again, depending on who was involved and how the crash happened, responsibility can shift between multiple parties. Let's break it down with common accident scenarios:

Passenger in an Uber or Lyft

Scenario: You're riding in the backseat of a Lyft when another car runs a red light and crashes into you.

Who's Liable? The at-fault driver (not your rideshare driver) is responsible, meaning their insurance should cover your injuries. If they're uninsured, Uber and Lyft's uninsured motorist coverage may apply.

Pedestrian Hit by a Rideshare Driver

Scenario: You're crossing the street at a marked crosswalk when an Uber driver, looking at their app for a pickup, hits you.

Who's Liable? The Uber driver is at fault, but their level of insurance coverage depends on whether they were actively transporting a passenger, on the way to a pickup, or just waiting for a ride request.

Another Driver Hit by an Uber or Lyft

Scenario: You're driving through an intersection with the right of way when a distracted Uber driver crashes into you.

Who's Liable? The Uber driver is at fault, and if they were actively working for Uber or Lyft at the time, the company's insurance may cover your damages.

Injuries at National Parks & Outdoor Attractions



California law treats bicycle hit-and-runs just like other crashes, meaning the fleeing driver faces criminal penalties if caught. Injured cyclists can also file a claim through their own auto insurance (if they have UM coverage) or explore other legal options.

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
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Rideshare Driver Injured in a Crash
